## **COVID-19 measures**

For all parents



Thank you for your support with the ongoing COVID measures. ## **Anti-Bullying Week**

#### **All parents**



Last week, we celebrated Anti-Bullying week with odd socks on the Monday! The focus of Anti-Bullying week was around One Kind Word and which highlighted that even a small action can break the cycle of bullying. The children talked about how checking someone is okay, saying hi to them or apologising can make a real difference. Classes also talked about how bullying is repeated anti-social behaviour towards another child, rather than a one-off unkind incident and what to do if they feel they are being bullied.

As part of Anti-Bullying week, the children also looked at speaking out if they are feel they are not looked after properly. This was being led through the NSPCC's Speak Out Stay Safe campaign. In Years 3 to 6, the children looked at what peer-on-peer abuse or bullying could look like, as part of our safeguarding measures to ensure children know how to get help if they are worried.



The week ended with Children in Need 2021. It was great to see so many spotty outfits, Pudsey ears and yellow t-shirts in school on Friday! We raised £ in total! Thank you for your support.

## **Beat Band Boogie**

#### Year 1/2 Parents



The Year 1 and 2 children enjoyed kicking off their new learning project with a drumming workshop, which took place just after the half term. A musician from Berkshire Maestros came into school and modelled using different drums, including a timbale drum, bongo drum and square drum as well as a classic drum set.



The musician played a number of different songs on different drums of different genres, such as jazz, latin, rock and classical. The children had the opportunity to try different drums as well as perform body percussion to We will rock you!

## **Predators in school**

**Year 3 Parents** 



Year 3 were lucky enough to have a number of different predators from Quirks Animal Workshop come into school after half term, as part of their learning project, Predators. The children got to see a praying mantis, python, tarantula and tree frog, including having the opportunity to touch some and hold others.



The children had chance to find out more about the different creatures, including what they ate, how old they were, their expected life span and what features made them predators.



They were particularly excited to see the python, whose name was Penelope!

## **Darwin's Delights**

#### **Year 6 Parents**



We had a number of birds of prey from Feathers and Fur Falconry swooping through the hall on the first week after half term to kick off the Year 6 learning project entitled Darwin's Delights. The children spent the afternoon learning about the criteria for what makes a bird a bird of prey, as well as being able to see four birds of prey up close – a hawk, falcon and two owls! They learnt lots of facts about the characteristics of these birds of prey.



Did you know that owls have asymmetrical ears as this allows them to pinpoint the source of the sound better or that owls fly silently!



The children really enjoyed this experience and it supported them with their English and learning project work.

#### **Stargazer**

#### Year 5 parents



Year 5 children and staff were lucky enough to see space during the first week after half term when they visited Winchester Science Museum. They started in the Sound, Hearing and Vibration Interactive Exhibition, where there was a 10m long guitar, earthquake simulator and a gigantic rocket.



After this, Year 5 then went to Explorer: Space, where they had a lot of fun exploring the Black Hole, the weights of the planets and how much energy a rocket takes to lift off from different planets. The children were the most excited about the Planetarium, where they zoomed from planet to planet, but not before studying the star constellations!



They ended the day in at a Rocket workshop. The children had to shake up their aerodynamically designed rockets filled with methylated spirits. We then raced them across space, by setting the methylated spirit on fire, to see which rocket would travel the furthest!

It was great to see so many of you enjoying the performances on Friday 22nd October, including some old faces who returned with their families! In particular, a very big thank you to Cristina Charlton-Perez and Karen Press who organised the circus on behalf of Friends of Radstock. They met with me several times to discuss COVID-19 prevention measures and worked with Public Health Wokingham to ensure it was a safe event.

Friends of Radstock are organising other events over the next few weeks to keep the fundraising up to pay for much needed items in school, such as our new tablets which children in Years 3 to 6 are enjoying using. Please continue to support them as much as you are able to!

## **Black History Month**

As I mentioned in our Curriculum News document sent out in September, the children across Radstock spent time studying an aspect of Black History Month during October. The children had 3 assemblies, looking at famous black Britons, such as Ade Adepitan, the Paralympic Basketball player, Benjamin Zephaniah, the poet and actor as well as Malorie Blackman, the children's author. In addition, each year group or area of the school focussed on a different aspect of Black History.

Nursery and Reception looked at different musicians and types of music, whilst Years 1 and 2 looked at Windrush. In Years 3 and 4, children looked at pre-colonial history and focussed on the Kingdom of Benin. Years 5 and 6 studied the Civil rights movement and black activism, particularly focused on events in the UK, rather than those in the US.
